

Introduction, Mission Statement & The Board

Introduction

The Ohio State Board of Optometry is a state government agency established by the legislature in 1919 to regulate the practice of optometry and provide consumer protection.

The Board is responsible for examining and licensing optometrists and enforcing the provisions of Chapter 4725 of the Ohio Revised Code as adopted by the Ohio General Assembly and Chapter 4725 of the Ohio Administrative Code as approved by the Joint Committee on Agency Rule Review.

Mission Statement

The mission of the Ohio State Board of Optometry is to assure professionally competent optometrists in the State of Ohio by regulating examinations and licensure, enforcing continuing education compliance, monitoring continuing education quality, renewal of licensure and enforcement of the Ohio Optometry Laws and Administrative Rules as found in Chapter 4725 of the Ohio Revised Code. The Optometry Board is dedicated to handling public concerns in a timely fashion and providing prompt, friendly service to the citizens of Ohio and licensees.

Composition of the Board

The Board is composed of six members, five of whom shall be persons actually engaged in the practice of optometry for five years preceding appointment and one of whom shall be a member of the public who is at least sixty years of age. Terms of office shall be for five years. No person shall serve as a member for more than two terms. Board members are compensated hourly only for time devoted to the Board's affairs, and are reimbursed for expenses incurred in the performance of their official duties.

President's Letter

The year 2010 has been another challenging one for the State Board of Optometry. We continue to wrestle with budgetary issues, as well as other regulatory issues. Our dedicated administrators and staff have risen to each challenge. Mike Everhart, our Executive Director, Nancy Ott, our Administrative Assistant, and Jeff May, our Chief Investigator are to be commended for their adaptability, resourcefulness and effectiveness in serving the citizens and optometrists in Ohio. It has been an honor and pleasure to work alongside them and serve in the capacity of Board President this year.

It has been equally gratifying to work with our dedicated and capable Board members. In 2010 our Board has continued to work toward clarifying certain rules that will maintain the independence of and preserve the control of professional clinical judgment for optometrists working in corporate settings. We approved for rule change up to 2 hours of Practice Management and/or Ethics Jurisprudence as part of our 25 hours of C.E. This will require legislative approval prior to final implementation. We have proposed raising the license fee, renewal fee and late fee in the upcoming budget. There has not been an increase in fees since 1995. We are also carefully monitoring the development of board certification and the continuing competency debate that is occurring within our profession on the national and state levels.

The Board and staff continued the activities of maintaining a website, publishing the newsletter, investigating consumer complaints, licensing and approving continuing education courses and responding to doctor's inquiries. We are grateful for our excellent relationships and insight from the Ohio Optometric Association, the Ohio Ophthalmological Society, the College of Optometry, and the Association of Regulatory Boards of Optometry and their liaisons.



Licensing

Licensing is the process by which an agency of government grants to individuals the right to engage in certain professions, occupations or businesses. Licensure is also an effective tool used for the protection of the citizens of the State of Ohio. This is done by assuring that the persons licensed have the required skills, training and qualifications to practice that profession. In order to be licensed in Ohio, optometrists must complete at least six years of college, be a graduate of an accredited College of Optometry and pass the required testing..

The State Board of Optometry is granted its authority under Chapter 4725 of the Ohio Revised Code. This chapter determines who may engage in the practice of optometry. The practice of optometry has been greatly enhanced by the use of diagnostic, therapeutic and limited Schedule III drugs. The laws that provide the authority for the Board to grant licenses also provide the necessary administrative mechanisms whereby such authority to practice can be renewed, suspended, permanently revoked or limited. Fines may also be imposed. Accordingly, persons granted authority by the Board to engage in the practice of optometry also are monitored to determine whether they should be permitted to continue in such activity.

Continuing Education

During 2010 all licensed optometrists were required to submit proof of attendance for twenty five hours of annual continuing education. The continuing education programs are directed to patient care, the utilization of new techniques, scientific and clinical advances and the diagnosis and treatment of eye disease. The submission of continuing education is closely monitored by the Board. Applications for renewal are not processed for licensees until the required hours of continuing education are submitted to the Board. Failure to complete continuing education by September 30th and/or submit continuing education by October 20th each year results in a \$75.00 penalty fee unless a time waiver has been approved by the Board. In 2010 there were six various waiver requests approved.

During 2010 the Optometry Board members reviewed a total of 210 proposed continuing education programs. Of that total one course was not approved and four courses were approved only in part. The unapproved lectures contained a total of five hours of continuing education that were either practice management or not optometry related subjects.

Investigations

The role of the Investigator for the Ohio State Board of Optometry is clearly defined as a position that was created to serve Ohio citizens through the enforcement of Ohio Optometry Board Laws and Administrative Rules. While the primary function of the Investigator is the investigation of patient complaints, the Investigator also conducts unannounced on-site inspections of optometry offices to check for compliance with Board Laws and Rules relating to licenses and name display, equipment requirements, and other Board regulations. The Board Investigator also enforces laws concerning advertising by Ohio optometrists and conducts Laws and Rules sessions for newly licensed optometrists.

During 2010, the Board forwarded 55 sets of complaint forms to patients who had contacted the Board regarding problems with optometrists. Patients filed a total of 23 formal complaints in addition to 3 complaints initiated by the Board for investigation. During the year 22 of the 26 formal complaints were investigated and finalized with the remaining 4 pending either further investigation, a hearing or final review. Additionally, 130 on-site inspections were conducted statewide. Advertising violation notification letters to optometrists were sent in 5 advertising matters. In all instances, responses were received that proper corrective action was being taken to address the problems. The Board Investigator made 24 laws and rules presentations with 75 licensees in attendance.

During 2010 no discipline was taken by the Board in any of the completed complaints. Refunds in complaint resolutions to consumers totaled \$1,508.84 for the year.
